**Biographical / historical note**: Almanacs in colonial and early America were popular publications found in many households. Contents included forecasts, astronomical information, planting guides, folklore and medical remedies. Special interest almanacs published by Christian groups, temperance societies, and abolitionists as well as comic ones were produced by the nineteenth century.

The oldest still-published national almanac is *Thomas' The Farmer's Almanack*. (The title and spelling of almanac varied over the years and it is now known as *The Old Farmer's Almanac*). First published in 1792 by Robert B. Thomas, he remained its editor for more than fifty years.

**Scope and Contents**: This artificial collection contains a variety of almanacs, two of which belonged to Noah Fifield. The provenance for the others is unknown. None are stamped Fifield Collection.

The almanacs in the first two boxes are arranged by publication and in chronological order. The bulk are Thomas' *The Farmer's Almanac*. Its title and spelling varied over the years. Date range is 1798 to 1893; many are missing.

Following *The Farmer's Almanac*, there is one issue of *The Temperance Almanac* published by the Massachusetts Temperance Union (1842), *The Yankee Farmers' Almanac* by Spofford (1844), and two issues of *The Christian Family Almanac* published by the American Tract Society (1868 and 1869).

The third box contains a collection of disparate almanacs, sewn together and with a board serving as a back cover. The date range is 1797 to 1841. There is no indication to whom these publications may have belonged or why they were put together in random fashion. There are issues of the widely circulated *The Farmer's Almanac* as well as specialty almanacs which may be rare. They include temperance and Christian almanacs, a Davy Crockett almanac (1837) containing some stories about him and an engraving of river boatman Mike Fink, and one named for William Henry Harrison (1841). Harrison was elected President of the U.S. in 1840 and died in 1841. The almanac appears to be campaign literature and includes an illustrated biography.

**Conditions governing access**. The almanacs are in poor to fair condition and should be used with care. Use copies in other formats if possible.
