Dear Councilor,

Happy New Year and congratulations on the start of a new term. A special welcome to the newly elected councilors.

As we begin a new year and council term, there is opportunity to build on the great progress we have made over the last six years. This opportunity is the result of our strong fiscal management through the COVID-19 pandemic and the infusion of federal relief funding to help cities and towns address and recover from the impacts of the pandemic.

I write to solicit your ideas, priorities and feedback as we move forward on these important decisions for Weymouth and our residents.

Below I will outline the available funding, some of the spending approved and being considered, as well as share the results of the resident survey regarding priorities for federal funding use, where more than two thousand residents responded.

The largest source of available funding is the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF), a part of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), which became law in March of 2021.

Weymouth received \$8,902,107.50 in direct funding on 5/19/2021. We have since earned \$22,926.50 in interest. We expect the second half of the direct funding in May of this year.

Instead of sending Weymouth's allotted \$11.2M in ARPA funds directly to the Town to utilize along with our direct funding, Norfolk County established a duplicative process for requesting and receiving our allotted funding through the county. Norfolk County also plans to keep the interest earned from our allotted funding as an administrative fee.

Recently, the United States Treasury issued its Final Rule for Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF), a part of the American Rescue Plan. ARPA funds must be used for costs incurred on or after March 3, 2021. Further, costs must be obligated by December 31, 2024, and expended by December 31, 2026.

Here is a summary of the eligible uses of ARPA funds:

- **Replace lost public sector revenue**, using this funding to provide government services up to the amount of revenue loss due to the pandemic.
- **Support the COVID-19 public health and economic response** by addressing COVID-19 and its impact on public health as well as addressing economic harms to households, small businesses, nonprofits, impacted industries, and the public sector.
- **Provide premium pay for eligible workers performing essential work**, offering additional support to those who have and will bear the greatest health risks because of their service in critical sectors.
- **Invest in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure**, making necessary investments to improve access to clean drinking water, to support vital wastewater and stormwater infrastructure, and to expand affordable access to broadband internet.

Attached is the "Coronavirus State & Local Fiscal Recovery Funds: Overview of the Final Rule" published by the U.S. Department of Treasury earlier this month. It provides a summary of the major provisions of the final rule on the eligible uses.

As you may recall, we surveyed residents asking each of them to select five (5) areas of investment they would like Weymouth to prioritize. We had a tremendous response, with over two thousand residents responding. Below are the results of the survey.

To date, ARPA funding has been used for COVID testing and health department staff time, the final design of Columbian Square, the purchase of library materials in order to meet the MBLC's materials expenditure requirement, replacing the gym floor at the Senior Center, an updated Complete Streets Prioritization Plan, and efforts to address food insecurity through the Weymouth Food Pantry. In total, \$1,385,963.90 has been expended or encumbered, with over \$760,000 of that for COVID testing and \$450,000 for the final design of Columbian Square.

In addition to available ARPA funding, Weymouth's Free Cash was recently certified at \$15,918,770.00. Please note that \$10 million of this is from the Host Community Agreement (HCA) with Enbridge. \$2,748,906 of that HCA funding has already been used to purchase our new fire engine and ladder as well as for the demolition and removal of the Wharf Street incinerator and design services for Beals Park.

There are a number of projects in need of funding and under consideration, including the long-awaited reconstruction of Columbian Square, which is now fully designed. Other improvements, programs and progress to be funded or under consideration include a continuation of our Pave-The Wey road and sidewalk improvement program, Beals Park improvements, The Wessagusset Walk and coastal embankment stabilization, an after-school recreation program for elementary school students, addressing community behavioral health needs (possibly partnering with South Shore Health), Iron Hill Park improvements, water/sewer infrastructure upgrades, and expanding wireless access and security across town.

Please send me your feedback and ideas on areas or specific projects you'd like to see addressed with our available funding. For reference, we set the following "Priorities and Principals for Consideration" of ARPA spending:

- Projects that have the greatest impact on residents, both directly and indirectly
- Projects that lead to economic opportunity and recovery
- Projects that make an impact on the town's physical infrastructure
- Projects that effectively assist vulnerable populations impacted by COVID-19
- One-time projects with no or limited recurring or ancillary costs
- Projects that produce savings or increase the town's revenue base in the future
- Existing Weymouth-based projects/programs that can be enhanced/expanded
- Projects that avert disruptive and costly delays, and promote efficiency
