Program Overview



What is the Safe Streets and Roads for All?

 Federal grant program – U.S. Department of Transportation – Federal Highway Administration (FHWA)




- Goal: Create a transportation system and mindset of users <u>and</u> its designers that eliminates all traffic related fatalities and substantially reduces serious crashes
- Includes: Funding Action Plans (up to \$10M) and Implementation (up to \$25M) grants
- Allows municipalities to apply directly FHWA and not go through DOT and regional agencies



What Is a Safe System Approach?

- Traffic fatalities & serious injuries are preventable
- Understanding that humans are vulnerable and make mistake
- We collectively need to be proactive and put safety first when designing improvements to the system



shift from a conventional safety approach because it focuses on both human mistakes AND human vulnerability and designs a system with many redundancies in place to protect everyone



What is a Vision Zero Plan?

- Developed, approved, and is the foundation of the SS4A grant program
- Include explicit goals and measurable strategies to implement and address safety challenges
- Include timelines and identified projects to guide future projects and eliminate traffic-related deaths and injuries



The Town's Award

- Town was awarded a grant of \$336,000 in early 2023 to develop its own Safety Action Plan.
- Federal Highway gave Notice to Proceed (NTP) in late 2023.
- Grant required 20% match by the Town that is a combination of \$ and in-kind services.

WEYMOUTH – The town will use funding from the federal government to study ways to improve traffic safety and prevent deadly crashes.

The town received \$336,000 from the federal Department of Transportation through the <u>Safe Streets For All program</u>. The program helps communities pursue projects that will improve safety and help prevent deaths and serious injuries on the nation's roadways.

"We're trying to achieve zero fatalities and substantially reduce serious-injury crashes that occur," Bill Scully, senior project manager at Kimley-Horn, said at a recent town council meeting. Kimley-Horn is a traffic consultant for the town.

The town will use the funding to develop a "Vision Zero" action plan during the next 10 months. The plan will include analysis of crash data to identify trends and high-risk areas and make data-driven policy and project recommendations. The town will host community meetings and seek resident feedback throughout the process.

A Vision Zero approach to road safety management is based on the belief that no death or serious injury is acceptable on roads



Requirements



High Injury Network: Analyzing data to identify places on the transportation system with the highest risk for fatal and serious injury crashes so that we can focus on our most important problem areas.



Equity Component: Identifying and prioritizing efforts in disadvantaged communities that are disproportionately affected by traffic crashes.



Public Input: Engaging with the public is a key part of the study.



List of Priority Streets and Intersections: Producing a list of feasible projects that have the most safety impact for the Town.



Educational and Enforcement Programs:

Identifying key behavioral changes needed to reduce crashes and methods for encouraging those changes.



Sustained Effort: Establishing a defined process and identifying an organization responsible for carrying out, updating, and monitoring progress.

Benefits

- Improved safety including reducing loss of life
- Enable the Town to pursue Implementation grants from FHWA for improvements
- Actions can include physical changes as well as enforcement and educational programs



Study Process

Scope

- Create a substantial public knowledge and engagement program
- Identify all fatal and high risk crash locations within the town
- Consider safety actions for all modes of travel
- Include enforcement and education in addition to engineering solutions
- Develop a Safety Action | Vision Zero Plan that meets the federal certification requirements

Meaningful Public Engagement


- Project webpage and dashboard
- Project tagline and promote
- VZAC made up of range of disciplines and perspectives
- Residential representation from each district appointed by Mayor
- Town Council participation via Public Safety Committee
- Social media messaging & news press releases
- In-person meetings in each district
- Online mapping and survey tool to gather public input

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Are there locations in Town where you feel there is an issue to consider?



Not all edge lines have been repainted Anonymous Also for bike lanes, if it is only painted that is not really any protection and does not encourage more inexperienced bikers to use the lanes Trotter Rd where the commuter car/train/pedestrian come together. South Weymouth commuter rail station needs a sidewalk on both sides of the entrance and the bike parking needs to be moved to a safer location. Distracted driving Anonymous 3A is very dangerous for bikers, and currently bike lanes along pleasant street are used as parking spots which makes them hard to use in the summer

Add left turn arrow from Main St southbound to winter st Lot of speeding through the landing area Anonymous Anywhere around park or school needs to be re-evaluated. This is a meeting point for residents and speed limits are not enforced. Yes. There are areas throughout town with wide channelized turn lanes that encourage higher vehicle speeds and long crossings and aren't conducive to pedestrian safety Rt 18 & Pond Street intersection (especially when the fast food restaurants come in) North Weymouth Bridge Street As improvements are made to Columbian Square, Central Street in South Weymouth (Stella Terrell Park) needs significant attention to safely connect pedestrians and cyclists to amenities in the square and on Main Street.

- Participate in implementation and tracking progress


Expectations from Town

- Commitment by town officials and all departments to embrace the goal and work towards eliminating fatal crashes
- Commitment will be in forms of:
 - A Vision Zero Policy
 - A Resolution by Town Council
 - Pledge by town leadership and the general public

2018 – 2023 Crash Density


- High crash concentrations identified
- The four town squares all have high crash locations





2018 – 2023 Fatal Crashes

- 15 Fatal Crashes
 - 7 of the fatal crashes were collisions with a pedestrian
- Spread throughout the whole town
- Columbian Square was the only square that had fatal crashes





2018 – 2023 Fatal Crashes & Incapacitating Injuries


- 85 Incapacitating Injuries
 - 4 collisions with a cyclist
 - 10 collisions with a pedestrian





2018 – 2023 Crash Density & EJ areas


- EJ population areas consist of a mix of Minority, Income, & English Isolation
- Many fatal/ incapacitating injuries are within the EJ areas






2018 – 2023 Pedestrian & Bicycle Crashes

- 83 collisions with a pedestrian
- 42 collisions with a cyclist
- Columbian Square and Jackson Square had the greatest number of collisions
