- Complete Streets are designed for all modes of transportation including cars, bikes, pedestrians, motorcycles, trucks, wheelchairs and buses.
- Complete Streets are inclusive of users of all ages and abilities.

What does a Complete Street look like?

Each street is unique and may include:

- Sidewalks
- Bike lanes
- Special bus lanes
- Accessible public transit stops
- Safe street crossings
- Pedestrian signals
- Curb extensions
- Narrow travel lanes
- Low-traffic alternative bike routes

Communities with Complete Streets are more walkable, bikeable, and inclusive, making all people feel safe and welcome. They have more vibrant business districts and healthier residents.

Complete Streets in Weymouth

- 2015, Complete Streets Policy adopted.
 The goal of this policy is to incorporate
 Complete Streets principles into every municipal transportation project.
- **2016,** five-year Complete Streets Prioritization Plan developed.

Weymouth has received \$386,643, which has funded:

- Pedestrian flashing beacons installed at 2 crosswalks
- A bus shelter constructed at Pleasant Street/ Main Street.
- 10 driver-speed feedback signs constructed along eight roadways
- Accessible curb ramps constructed at 5 crosswalks

What are the benefits of having Complete Streets?

Improves safety

Streets designed with sidewalks, raised medians, better bus stop placement, traffic-calming measures and features for disabled travelers improve safety for all users.

Encourages good health

Walking and biking to schools, stores and other destinations reduce the risk of many preventable chronic diseases.

Lowers transportation costs for families

Car trips can be replaced by less expensive options such as walking, biking and public transportation.

Fosters strong communities

Complete Streets foster livable communities where all people feel safe and welcome .

Helps the environment

With safer transportation alternatives, people can make transportation choices that are more environmentally friendly.

Allows people to "age in place"

Streets that are safe to walk on enable residents to remain in their homes and communities as they age.
